

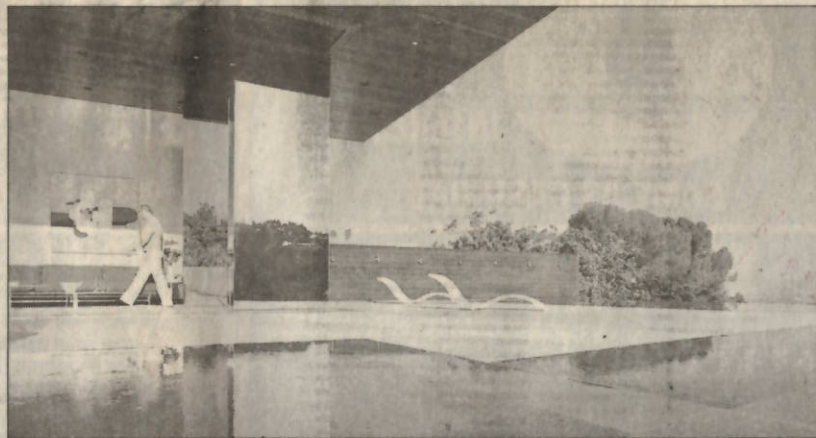
Kitchen storage in style

Consumers shopping for modern kitchens often complain about a dearth of choices between high-end European manufacturers and low-end IKEA. Custom cabinetry maker Henrybuilt aims to fill that void with its new company, Viola Park, scheduled to launch July 15. Modules will be made in Henrybuilt's Seattle shop with Forest Stewardship Council-certified woods. 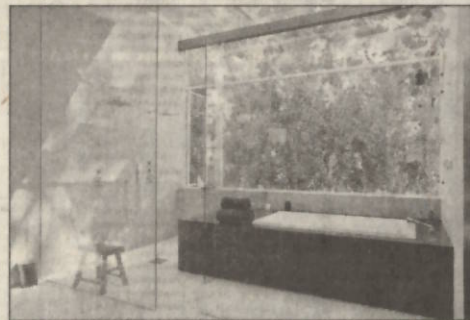

Inside looking out

Online readers will find a bonus this week: a tour through the recently completed Hollywood Hills house by L.A. architecture firm Assembledge. It's a house that doesn't blur the line between indoors and out; the house erases it. White terrazzo floor flows from the family room, past the floor-to-ceiling glass sliders and onto the terrace, where an infinity pool seemingly spills off the hillside.
